# Fall Camporee – Sept 23-25, 2011

## **Camp Check out Procedures.**

This year the camp requires that each troop must have a formal check out procedure. When you are ready to check out please contact one of the staff and request a check out time. We will come with you to inspect your campsite to be sure that all platforms have been put back in SM cabin or in a protected area , that fires are completely out (you must be able to put your bare hand into the fire as far as possible) and that there is no damage or trash. Toilet and Ramada areas must be clean. Upon checking out of camp we will give you your Camporee patches. Let's leave our campsites better then what we found.

## **Fire Restrictions**

We will keep everyone posted as to fire restrictions. It may not be possible to have a campfire in your camp if fire restrictions are in place. If fire restrictions are not in place we must be careful with campfires. Fires that are not attended must be completely out. Fires can only be built in designated campfire places.

## **Weather - Toilets - Water**

Expect the weather to be warm - Should go down at night but during the day may be in the 80s or higher. Always prepare for rain. There will be flushing modern toilets in most campsites. Please bring your own toilet paper and garbage bags. There will be dumpsters to put trash in. All trash put in dumpsters must first be put in a plastic bag. Water will be available at all campsites. There are no tents, each unit should bring tents.

## **First Aid - Safety**

Please report any injuries to medical staff at Dinning Hall. Each unit should bring a first aid kit and plenty of water for scouts to have during Saturday. Suggest that leaders provide cold water bottles to their scouts on Saturday. Encourage scouts to drink water often. Please be sure that no rocks are thrown and that your scouts act safely in all they do. Please have scouts follow the buddy system. Let's do our best to make this an accident free Camporee.

## **Preparation for Events**

Please bring a shovel and bucket for gold panning. The plank walking event will have some deep mud should a scout fall off (which is to be expected ) so the scout should wear clothing that will not be damaged by water and mud. Events will be competitive with prizes given out to three best patrols/pack at the award ceremony. Each event will require the patrol to give their patrol name and yell. Points will be awarded not only for best time or score but also for conduct, working together and organization.





### **Campfire Skits**

Campfire Saturday Night 7:30 to 8:30 - turn in skits on registration form. Would be fun to have some buccaneer type skits.

### **Uniform Inspection**

As in prior years - SPL will be expected to complete the uniform inspection and complete the uniform inspection form. Forms are available during check in. The SPL will inspect each scout's uniform just before the flag ceremony, complete the form, and stand first in line with the completed form. Sometime before or after the flag ceremony an inspector will review and collect the form. This year ten points (out of 100) will be given for a scarf, arm band, hat or other items (all must be matching) that is part of buccaneer theme.

### **Campsite Inspections**

Camp Sites - Extra points for going with the theme – when you prepare your menu – use buccaneer names for the food (be sure to post your menus). Rename your camp site to a buccaneer ship or buccaneer cove – be sure to post the name so we can see it. Use or make a buccaneer flag, or other buccaneer items to dress up your campsite – many buccaneers did not like sleeping on board their boat. They often would dock their boats and sleep on shore – make your camp look like a buccaneer camp on shore. Keep in mind that all the buccaneers on this Camporee are expected to be neat and clean.

Be sure to post your unit number somewhere and if you are sharing a campsite be sure inspectors know where each unit is.

### **Vehicles**

After you check in at the Dining hall upon entering camp, only one equipment vehicle will be allowed to transport camp equipment to camp site. Scouts are expected to walk. All vehicles must be removed to parking lot - Council has said any vehicle left in Camp could cost us a \$50 fine. We want to be sure we follow all Camp rules and ask that you pay particular attention to this rule – thanks for understanding. All vehicles must be out of Camp by Cracker-barrel (9 PM), unless special permission has been obtained with a special pass for a medical concern. Equipment trailers can stay at campsite so long as two vehicles are in parking lot.

## Youth Protection

The Boy Scouts of America places the greatest importance on creating the most secure environment possible for our youth members. To maintain such an environment, the BSA developed numerous procedural and leadership selection policies and provides parents and leaders with resources for the Cub Scout, Boy Scout, and Venturing programs.

The adult application requests background information that should be checked by the unit committee or the chartered organization before accepting an applicant for unit leadership. While no current screening techniques exist that can identify every potential child molester, we can reduce the risk of accepting a child molester by learning all we can about an applicant for a leadership position—his or her experience with children, why he or she wants to be a Scout leader, and what discipline techniques he or she would use.

### **Effective June 1, 2010**

- **Youth Protection training is required for all BSA registered volunteers, regardless of their position.**
- **New leaders are required to take Youth Protection training before submitting an application for registration. The certificate of completion for this training must be submitted at the time the application is made and before volunteer service with youth begins.**
- **Youth Protection training must be taken every two years. If a volunteer's Youth Protection training record is not current at the time of recharter, the volunteer will not be reregistered.**

### **Barriers to Abuse Within Scouting**

The BSA has adopted the following policies to provide additional security for our members. These policies are primarily for the protection of our youth members; however, they also serve to protect our adult leaders from false accusations of abuse.

**Two-deep leadership.** Two registered adult leaders or one registered leader and a parent of a participant, or other adult, one of whom must be 21 years of age or older, are required on all trips and outings. The chartered organization is responsible for ensuring that sufficient leadership is provided for all activities.

**No one-on-one contact.** One-on-one contact between adults and youth members is not permitted. In situations that require personal conferences, such as a Scoutmaster's conference, the meeting is to be conducted in view of other adults and youths.

**Respect of privacy.** Adult leaders must respect the privacy of youth members in situations such as changing clothes and taking showers at camp, and intrude only to the extent that health and safety require. Adults must protect their own privacy in similar situations.

**Cameras, imaging, and digital devices.** While most campers and leaders use cameras and other imaging devices responsibly, it has become very easy to invade the privacy of individuals. It is inappropriate to use any device capable of recording or transmitting visual images in shower houses, restrooms, or other areas where privacy is expected by participants.

**Separate accommodations.** When camping, no youth is permitted to sleep in the tent of an adult other than his own parent or guardian. Councils are strongly encouraged to have separate shower and latrine facilities for females. When separate facilities are not available, separate times for male and female use should be scheduled and posted for showers.

**Proper preparation for high-adventure activities.** Activities with elements of risk should never be undertaken without proper preparation, equipment, clothing, supervision, and safety measures.

**No secret organizations.** The Boy Scouts of America does not recognize any secret organizations as part of its program. All aspects of the Scouting program are open to observation by parents and leaders.

**Appropriate attire.** Proper clothing for activities is required. For example, skinny-dipping is not appropriate as part of Scouting.

**Constructive discipline.** Discipline used in Scouting should be constructive and reflect Scouting's values. Corporal punishment is never permitted.

**Hazing prohibited.** Physical hazing and initiations are prohibited and may not be included as part of any Scouting activity.

**Junior leader training and supervision.** Adult leaders must monitor and guide the leadership techniques used by junior leaders and ensure that BSA policies are followed.

**Member responsibilities.** All members of the Boy Scouts of America are expected to conduct themselves in accordance with the principles set forth in the Scout Oath and Law. Physical violence, hazing, bullying, theft, verbal insults, drugs, and alcohol have no place in the Scouting program and may result in the revocation of a Scout's membership in the unit.

**Unit responsibilities.** The head of the chartered organization or chartered organization representative and the local council must approve the registration of the unit's adult leader. Adult leaders of Scouting units are responsible for monitoring the behavior of youth members and interceding when necessary. Parents of youth members who misbehave should be informed and asked for assistance in dealing with it.



**Internet Advancement Enhancements:** Internet Advancement, the online service for units submitting youth member advancement, has been enhanced with important new features. Among these are the following:

- Youth Protection Training (YPT) completed date – the last YPT completed date from the person record, if any, is displayed on the Unit Roster report. The course code is included based on the unit program type.
- View Previous Advancement Reports – This new feature provides access to the List of Reports Submitted for the unit. No longer will a unit have only one opportunity to get the advancement report online or be required to contact the council to obtain a prior report that was submitted.
- Academic and Sports Belt Loops – Cub Scout packs may enter and submit the dates on which Belt Loops have been earned by pack members. This feature is available by Multiple Person Entry and individual entry.
- Tiger Cub rank – Cub Scout packs may enter completion of the Tiger Cub rank for members who earned the award as a Tiger Cub but did not have it entered in their records.

Please encourage unit volunteers to check out these enhancements and to use Internet Advancement.

## GUIDES TO UNIT MONEY-EARNING PROJECTS

A unit's money-earning methods should reflect Scouting's basic values. Whenever your unit is planning a money-earning project, this checklist can serve as your guide. If your answer is "Yes" to all the questions that follow, it is likely the project conforms to Scouting's standards and will be approved.

**1. Do you really need a fund-raising project?**

There should be a real need for raising money based on your unit's program. Units should not engage in money-earning projects merely because someone has offered an attractive plan. Remember that individual youth members are expected to earn their own way. The need should be beyond normal budget items covered by dues.

**2. If any contracts are to be signed, will they be signed by an individual, without reference to the Boy Scouts of America and without binding the local council, the Boy Scouts of America, or the chartered organization?**

Before any person in your unit signs a contract, he must make sure the venture is legitimate and worthy. If a contract is signed, he is personally responsible. He may not sign on behalf of the local council or the Boy Scouts of America, nor may he bind the chartered organization without its written authorization. If you are not sure, check with your district executive for help.

**3. Will your fund-raiser prevent promoters from trading on the name and goodwill of the Boy Scouts of America?**

Because of Scouting's good reputation, customers rarely question the quality or price of a product. The nationwide network of Scouting units must not become a beehive of commercial interest.

**4. Will the fund-raising activity uphold the good name of the BSA? Does it avoid games of chance, gambling, etc.?**

Selling raffle tickets or other games of chance is a direct violation of the BSA Rules and Regulations, which forbid gambling. The product must not detract from the ideals and principles of the BSA.

**5. If a commercial product is to be sold, will it be sold on its own merits and without reference to the needs of Scouting?**

All commercial products must sell on their own merits, not the benefit received by the Boy Scouts. The principle of value received is critical in choosing what to sell.

**6. If a commercial product is to be sold, will the fund-raising activity comply with BSA policy on wearing the uniform?**

The official uniform is intended to be worn primarily for use in connection with Scouting activities. However, council executive boards may approve use of the uniform for any fund-raising activity. Typically, council popcorn sales or Scout show ticket sales are approved uniform fund-raisers.

**7. Will the fund-raising project avoid soliciting money or gifts?**

The BSA Rules and Regulations state, "Youth members shall not be permitted to serve as solicitors of money for their chartered organizations, for the local council, or in support of other organizations. Adult and youth members shall not be permitted to serve as solicitors of money in support of personal or unit participation in local, national, or international events."

For example: Boy Scouts/Cub Scouts and leaders should not identify themselves as Boy Scouts/Cub Scouts or as a troop/pack participate in The Salvation Army's Christmas Bell Ringing program. This would be raising money for another organization. **At no time are units permitted to solicit contributions for unit programs.**

**8. Does the fund-raising activity avoid competition with other units, your chartered organization, your local council, and the United Way?**

Check with your chartered organization representative and your district executive to make certain that your chartered organization and the council agree on the dates and type of fund-raiser.

**The local council is responsible for upholding the Charter and By-laws and the Rules and Regulations of the BSA. To ensure compliance, all unit fund-raisers MUST OBTAIN WRITTEN APPROVAL from the local council NO LESS THAN 14 DAYS before the fund-raising activity.**

# 2013 National Scout Jamboree

## July 5 – July 25, 2013

Boston Tour – This tour will begin in Boston, with visits to New York City, Philadelphia/Gettysburg and Washington D.C. prior to the National Jamboree.

### Council Contingent:

The Grand Canyon Council will take a contingent of 9 Troops with 36 youth and 4 adult leaders in each Troop. Seven troops are designated to tour the Northeast for 10 days prior to the National Jamboree. Two Troops will tour only the Washington D.C. area prior to the National Jamboree.

### Qualification for Scouts:

- Be at least First Class at the time of attendance at the Jamboree
- Have completed sixth grade or be at least 12-years-old by July 1, 2013 and have not reached his 18th birthday by July 24, 2013.
- Participate in all pre-jamboree training experiences.
- Submit a Jamboree Medical Form.
- Be approved by his local unit leader and the Grand Canyon Council Jamboree committee.

### Financial Details For This Tour Package:

Reserve your place now with a \$350 Non-Refundable Application Deposit. The Jamboree fee for the tour is \$3,500 per Scout. This fee includes all transportation, tours, admission fees, meals, lodging, special patches, neckerchief, most patrol and Troop equipment, and a Jamboree Training weekend. A payment schedule and contract is attached, with installments due beginning April 1, 2011, and the final payment due NO LATER than April 10, 2013.

### Additional Costs to Consider:

Please be aware that there are always additional expenses to consider that are not part of the above Jamboree fee. Additional expenses might include: troop committee expenses, which are determined by each troop, spending money for snacks and souvenirs on the tour, personal equipment and uniforms (the new "centennial" uniform is required). These additional costs may be \$300 - \$400, or more, and are the responsibility of the participant and his family.

The total accrued installments must be paid in no less than five equal monthly payments, beginning 60 days after registration. This is in addition to the regular installment payments which become due after registration. *[example: if you signed up on December 1, 2011, at the time of signing, you would need to pay the \$350 deposit, and then make 5 monthly payments of \$210.00  $[(\$1,400.00 - \$350.00) / 5]$ , beginning February 1, 2012, in addition to the regular installment payments, above.]*

**PAST DUE PAYMENTS:** If any regular and/or accrued payments are not received by the Council office within 10 days after the above due dates, a non-refundable late fee of 10% of the past due amount will be assessed.

If any payments become 90 days past due, **you may be removed from the active roster** and placed on a stand-by / waiting list until all payments are made current. While on the stand-by/waiting list, your "slot" in the troop may be given to another scout who is able to pay all of the accrued fees at the time he is invited to join the troop. If there is no "slot" available in your desired troop when you become current, you have the option of being placed in another troop, if there is a "slot" available in that troop.

**REFUND POLICY:** If you sign up and then find that you cannot attend, or you are removed because of non-payment, you will receive a refund from the Grand Canyon Council of fees paid, less the \$350 non-refundable deposit. In the event there is no alternate, a partial refund will be made, based on the fees you have paid to date, less the non-refundable \$350 deposit and any non-refundable expenses paid by the Council related to the contractual agreements made on your behalf. For Every One Hundred Boys Who Join Scouting...

Of any one hundred boys who become Scouts, it must be confessed that thirty will drop out in their first year. Perhaps this may be regarded as a failure, but in later life all of these will remember that they had been Scouts and will speak well of the program.

Of the one hundred, only rarely will one ever appear before a juvenile court judge.

Twelve of the one hundred will be from families that belong to no church. Through Scouting, these twelve and many of their families will be brought into contact with a church and will continue to be active all their lives.

Six of the one hundred will become pastors.

Each of the one hundred will learn something from Scouting. Almost all will develop hobbies that will add interest throughout the rest of their lives.

Approximately one-half will serve in the military, and in varying degrees profit from their Scout training.

At least one will use it to save another person's life and many will credit it with saving their own.

Today, four of the one hundred will reach Eagle rank, and at least one will later say that he valued his Eagle above his college degree.

Many will find their future vocation through merit badge work and Scouting contacts.

Seventeen of the one hundred boys will later become Scout leaders and will give leadership to thousands of additional boys.

Only one in four boys in America will become Scouts, but it is interesting to know that of the leaders in this nation in business, religion and politics, three out of four were Scouts.

This story will never end. Like the "Golden Pebble" of service dropped into the human sea it will continue to radiate in ever-widening circles, influencing the characters of men down through unending time.

Scouting's alumni record is equally impressive. A recent nation-wide survey of high schools revealed the following information:

85% of student council presidents were Scouts  
89% of senior class presidents were Scouts  
80% of junior class presidents were Scouts  
75% of school publication editors were Scouts  
71% of football captains were Scouts

Scouts also account for:

64% of Air Force Academy graduates  
68% of West Point graduates  
70% of Annapolis graduates  
72% of Rhodes Scholars  
85% of F.B.I. agents  
26 of the first 29 astronauts

AND a previous survey of leaders revealed that:

- seventeen of our United States Senators
- over 60 of our Congressmen
- eleven of our state Governors
- fourteen of our senior military officers
- over 1700 chief executive officers/presidents/heads of corporations are all Eagle Scouts.

Of the 214 former and present astronauts, 142 have taken part in Scouting. 33 became Eagle Scouts, including Neil Armstrong who said "Houston, Tranquility Base here. The Eagle has landed." He also was the 1st man ever to step onto the moon and while doing so said, "That's one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind" six and a half hours after landing.

# Merit Badge Counselor Application Process (Grand Canyon Council)

New Merit Badge Counselors or Dropped Membership as a registered Merit Badge Counselor can follow the below Merit badge application Process:

**1. Submit a completed Adult Registration form and Disclosure form (Both are the standard two part registration form).**

The only signature required is of the person applying to be the Merit Badge Counselor. It is required by National that a separate application be turned in to register as a Merit Badge Counselor.

Notes:

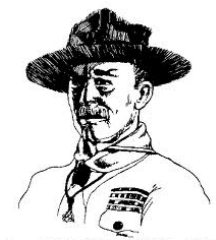
- a. If the Individual on the application wants to register as a Merit Badge Counselor and as a Scout Unit Leader or as a Member of Committee the two additional signatures will be required to approve the Scout Unit Position. With two positions being applied for it is required to have a copy to process **two separate applications**.
- b. If the applicant is already approved and registered in a unit as a leader or as Member of Committee, another adult application is still required be filled out and turned in to register as a Merit Badge Counselor.
- c. The Merit Badge registration is good for the current year. Annual registration starts in March and drops the end of February. Please check with your District Executive to know if your leaders are currently registered as Merit badge counselors.

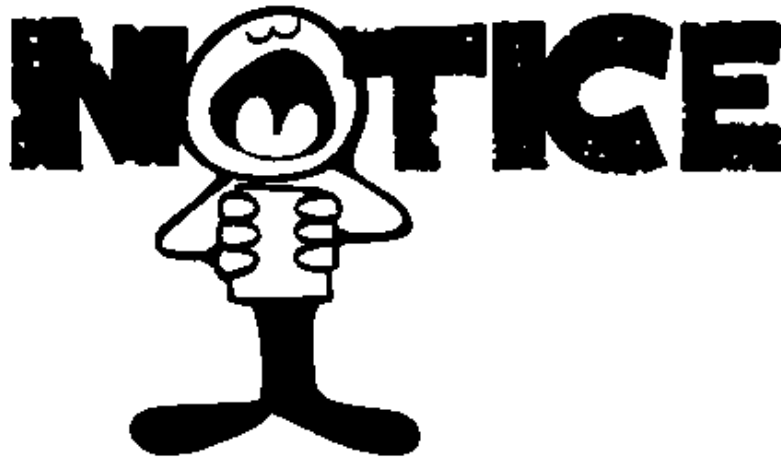
**2. Submit a copy of the Youth Protection Card (always required to be turned in with every adult application)**

**3. Submit the Merit Badge Counselor registration form**

Notes:

- a. This form is a separate form that explains what merit badges will be taught and specifies in which areas the Counselor prefers to assist (unit scouts, district wide scouts, or council wide scouts).
- b. If the applicant is already registered as a Merit Badge Counselor for the current year and would like to update or add additional merit badges they would like to teach; this form can be submitted without the Adult registration form.

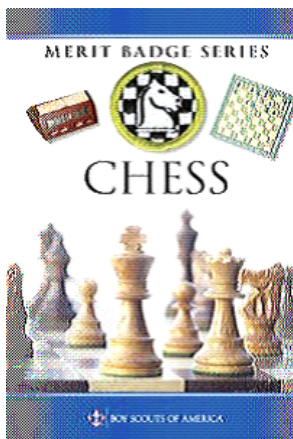




## NEW MERIT BADGE

# Wilderness First Aid 16-Hour Course

## Course Information:

This 16-hour Wilderness First Aid course is for persons involved in activities that take them beyond the scope of traditional urban emergency medical services, when help is delayed in urban or rural situations, and mass casualty incidents. While many excursions are held in areas where transportation and emergency services are available, help may still be slow in arriving. This course is useful when in remote areas, in urban areas during and after disasters, or when emergencies occur during large gatherings, all of which can require care of the victim beyond the skills taught in regular first aid classes. Wilderness First Aid includes realistic scenarios where you will decide what is wrong with the "patient" and how to handle the situation, and whether you are "in town" or miles away from an emergency room or paramedic care. The main textbook is written in collaboration with the Wilderness Medical Society (WMS) and the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons (AAOS).

*NOTE: This course does not include CPR. If you wish to take a CPR class or recertify your current CPR card, we will schedule a separate CPR class.*

### Memo: Grand Canyon Council Training Initiative Policy

Date: January 19, 2011

It is the position of the Grand Canyon Council that all adult leaders in the Scouting program will help deliver a higher quality program to all youth when the adults are well trained in the positions in which they volunteer. Boy Scouts of America has numerous training programs to cover the requirements for all adult volunteers. Grand Canyon Council has required that all adult volunteers complete the requisite training on a regular schedule. All top leaders (Cubmaster, Scoutmaster, Varsity Coach and Venturing Advisors) were supposed to be finished with all training by the end of 2010. If there are any top leaders who still need to complete a portion of the training, there is a short extension. However ALL top leaders MUST be trained by end of first quarter, 2011.

All Direct Contact Leaders (Assistant CM, ASM, Asst. Coaches, Asst. Venturing Adv, Den Leaders, Asst Den Leaders, Tiger Leaders) must be trained by end of 2011. All Districts have planned at least two classes in each area throughout 2011. There will be adequate opportunity to complete all aspects of the training.

All other adult volunteers must be trained by end of 2012. This includes Committee members, Committee Chairs, COR, and all leaders new to their respective positions.

The only troop position an 18-21 year old can hold is as Assistant Scoutmaster.

Please make sure your leaders know that as far as training is concerned, that 11 year old Scoutmasters need to take the same courses an Assistant Scoutmaster needs to take to satisfy the mandatory training requirement this year.

### Testing Out Of Introduction to Outdoor Leadership Skills



If you feel you have all the skills required in Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills it may not be necessary to take the course. Anyone who feels they can demonstrate all of the skills for Tenderfoot, Second Class and First Class should send a note to me and I can send you an open book, multiple choice test to test out. Minimal requirements to test out include having assisted a Scout from Tenderfoot to First Class.

### BALOO vs. IOLS or OWLS

The question has come up on whether Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills training (IOLS) or Outdoor Webelos Leader Skills training (OWLS), which for our district is the same class, can count as meeting the requirement for BALOO training. For example, if you have a leader who is an Asst. Scoutmaster in a Troop, has taken the IOLS as part of that training, and is a Den Leader in your Pack. He is obviously very experienced on outings and is both the Troop and Pack's Outdoor Coordinator. Does he still need to take BALOO training? The question is also pertinent for leaders who will become Webelos leaders next fall. You need more adults with BALOO training for outings, and a Webelos leader that is doing a Webelos outing needs IOLS. Could I have them take IOLS, and skip BALOO?

The answer is that the two trainings are very different and teach two very different things. Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills training teaches how to take a troop, patrol or Webelos den camping and how to teach them basic camping skills (knot tying, fire building, compass reading, etc.) BALOO teaches how to take a very large group, with a wide range of ages and skills, on a campout and the BSA safety policies surrounding such an activity. So the answer to the question is no, the two courses are not equivalent and to take a pack camping you still need a BALOO trained adult even if a IOLS trained adult is present.

---

### Required training for Activities:

- ▶ Youth Protection trained adults are required on all activities.
- ▶ One adult who has completed Planning and Preparing for Hazardous Weather is required for every activity.
- ▶ Where swimming or boating is included in the program, Safe Swim Defense and/or Safety Afloat standards are to be followed.
- ▶ At least one person must be trained in CPR from any recognized agency for Safety Afloat & Climb on Safely
- ▶ If climbing/rappelling is included, then Climb on Safely (which recommends the American Red Cross' standard first aid and When Help is Delayed or equivalent course) must be followed.

Training is valid for two years from the date completed.

All courses except for the CPR courses are available online at [www.myscouting.org](http://www.myscouting.org).

# Training Courses Requiring Recertification

Most BSA training courses do not require recertification with the obvious exception for Youth Protection Training (YPT) which is required every two years. However, there are a few that do...

**The following is a list of courses requiring recertification and the timeframe for each:**

- ▶ Trainer's EDGE ..... Three years
- ▶ Safety Afloat..... Two years
- ▶ Paddle Craft Safety ..... Three years
- ▶ Swimming and Water Rescue..... Two years
- ▶ Chain Saw Safety ..... Two years
- ▶ Leader Specific Training-----recommended (not required) to be taken every five years.

Note: National Camping School certification is good for five camping seasons.

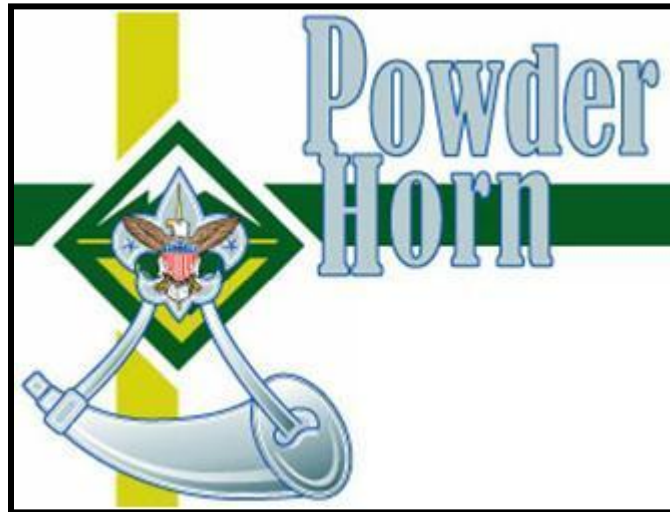

- 2) Of the 48 Youth and Adult that attended the National Order of the Arrow Conference in Indiana 7/31-8/6 2009, 22 were from this chapter
